Pieter Andriessen was listed, in 1648, among the tapsters of New Amsterdam.—*Rec. N.* Am., I: 8.

Undoubtedly, his tavern was here, for his property on the Cingel (Block Q, No. 4) was far from the centre of population in 1648.

Pieter had died before May, 1664.—*Ibid.*, V: 66. His widow, Grietje Gerritsen, was confirmed here in 1667.—*Patents*, II: 12 (Albany). Her executor, Cornelis Clopper, the blacksmith, sold the house to Barent Coersen, merchant, May 20, 1670.—*Liber Deeds*, B: 171; cf. Book of Records of Deeds & Transfers (etc.), 1665–1672 (translated), 176–7. In the deed, the breadth of the property on the south side was given as "from the middle of the passage betwixt the s<sup>d</sup> house & the house of Jn<sup>o</sup> Cooley." This passage, or alley, is clearly shown on the Plan.
